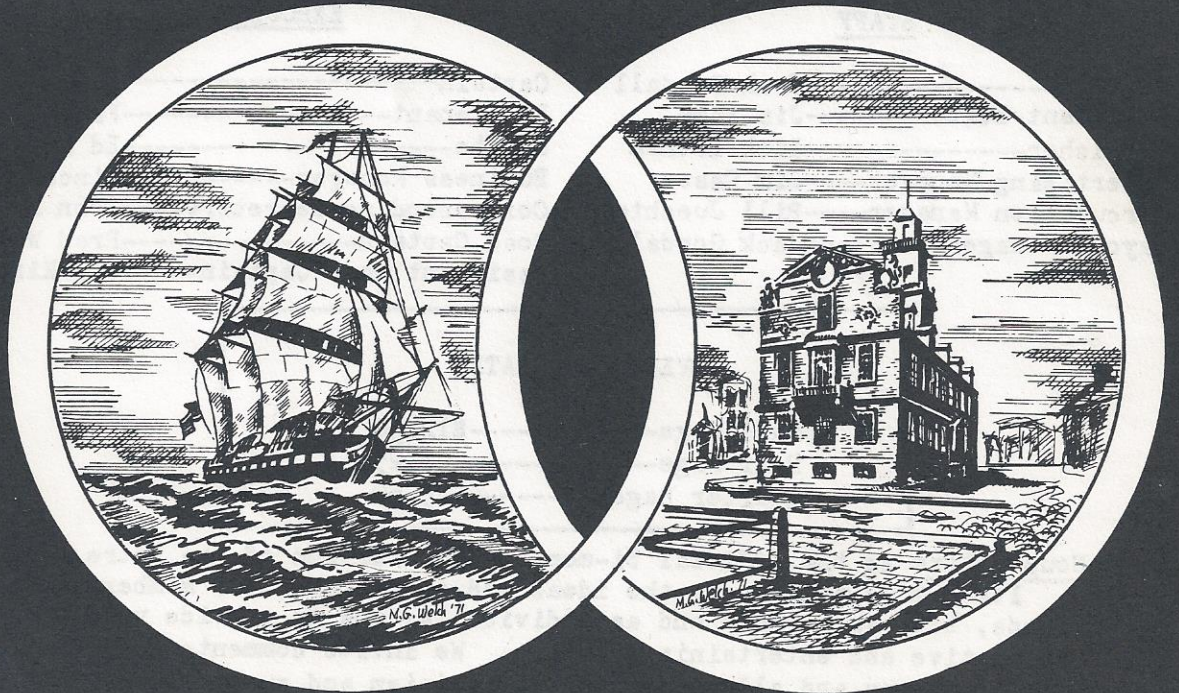
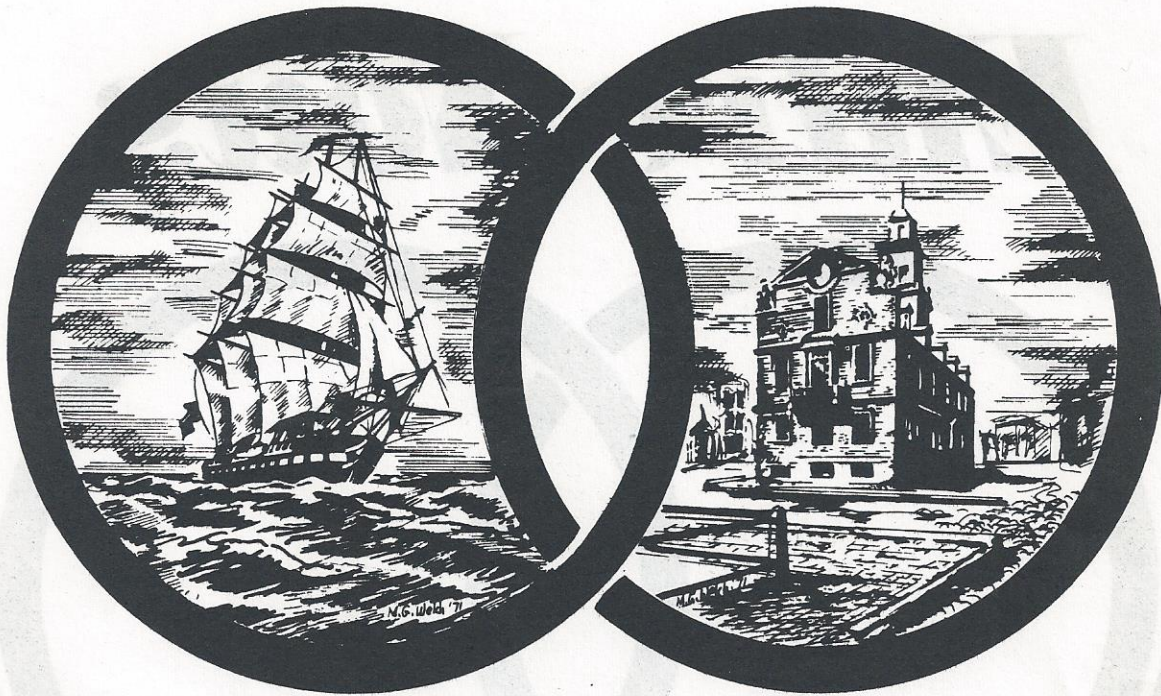

The attitude of your club is one which makes it worthwhile to belong to "the group" and it reflects well on the principles of leather clubs as a whole.

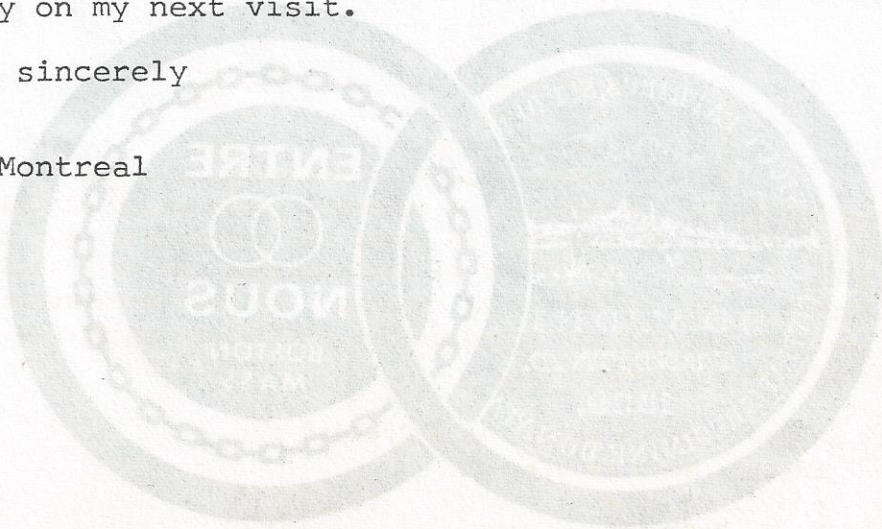

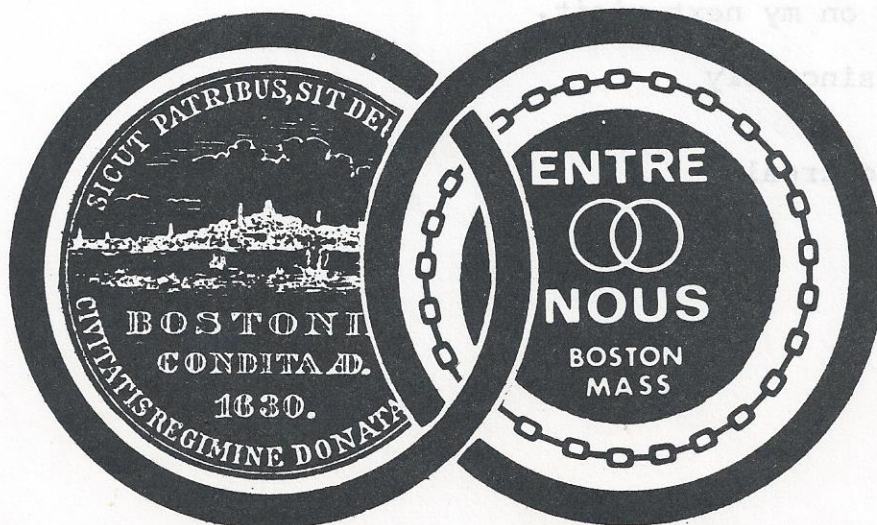

Thanks again, guys, for a memorable weekend. Hope to see you all again real soon.

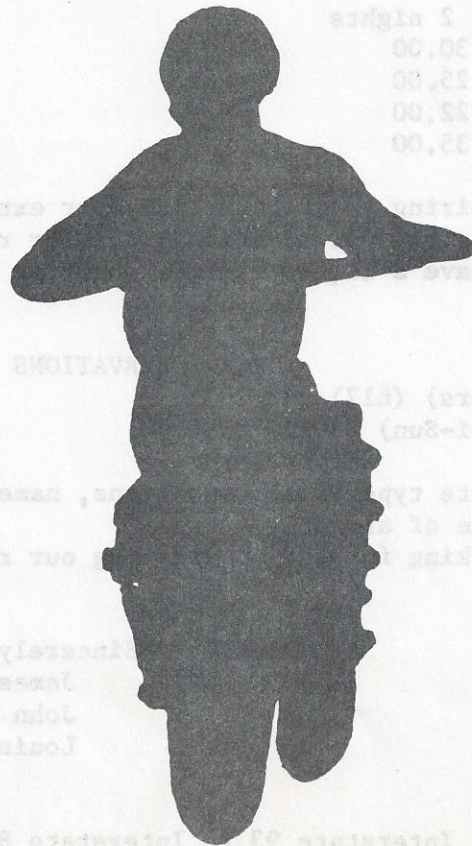

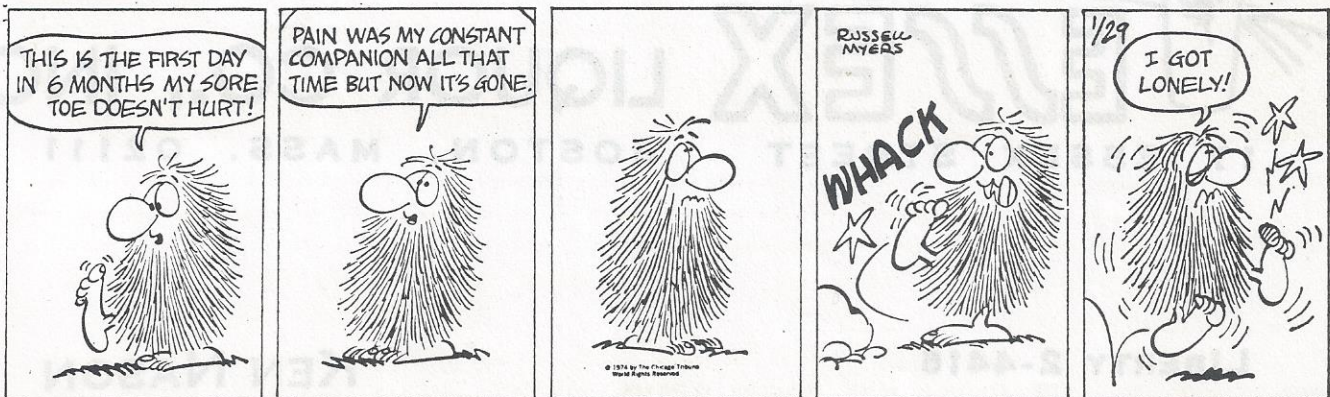

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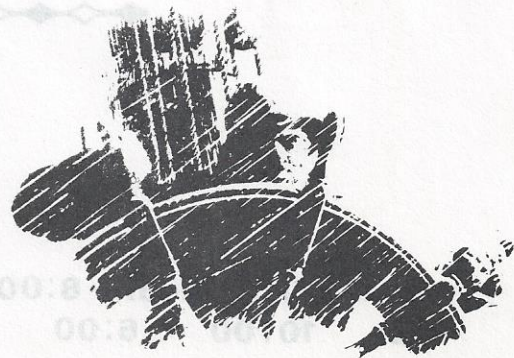

1. OFFICER RESIGNS--Fred K., formerly Secretary of the AMCC resigned and Sam J., President of the Vikings M.C. accepted appointment as Secretary Pro-tem to fill out the remainder of his term.
2. CHECK PRESENTED--The SMCLA presented a check to the AMCC Fund from profits realized from the Slave Auction held at their Autumn Scrambles.
3. SUPER RUN '76--The possibility of a "Super Run '76" was discussed, and a committee was appointed to determine whether such a plan is feasible.

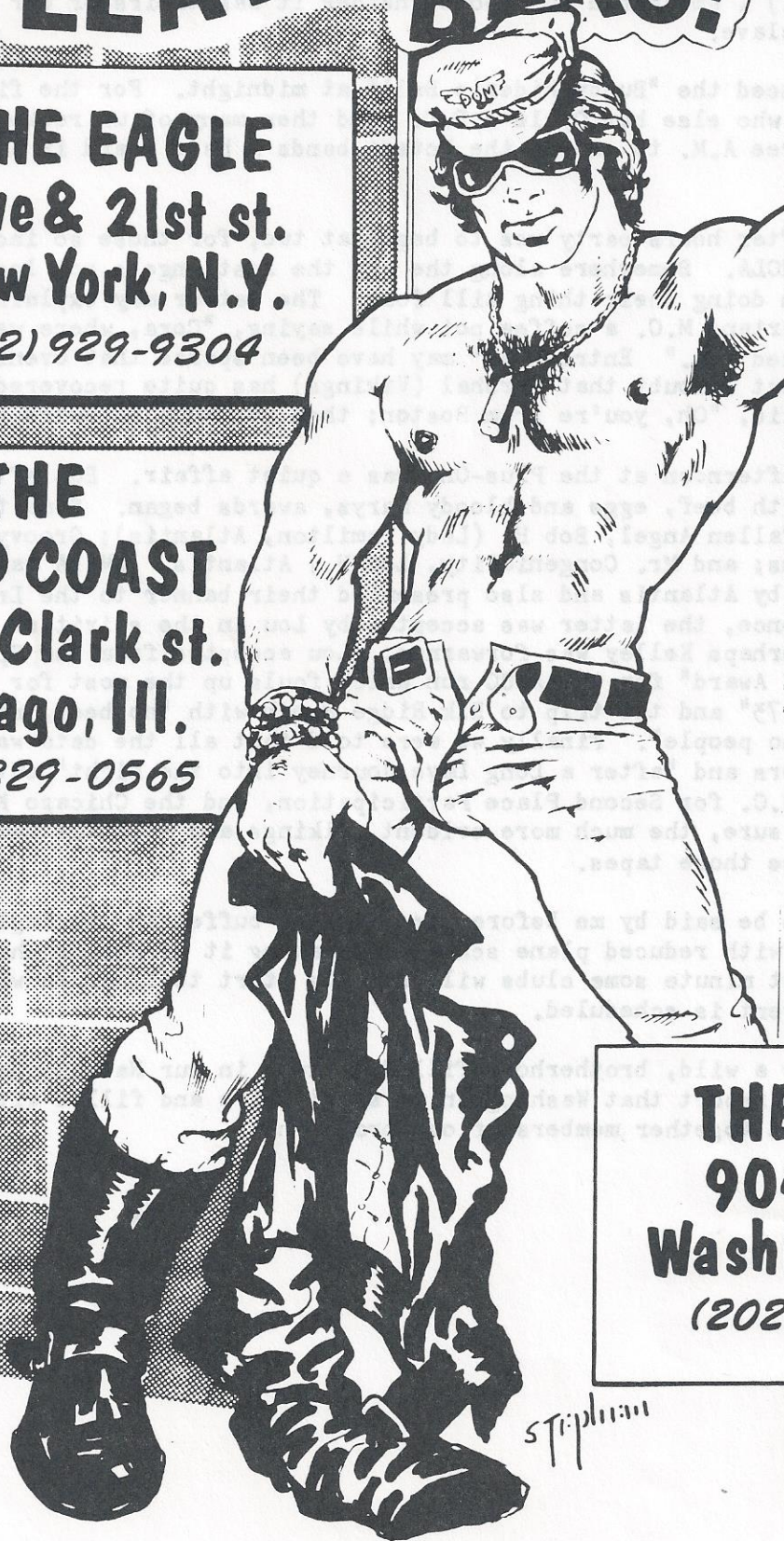
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# PRAETORIANS

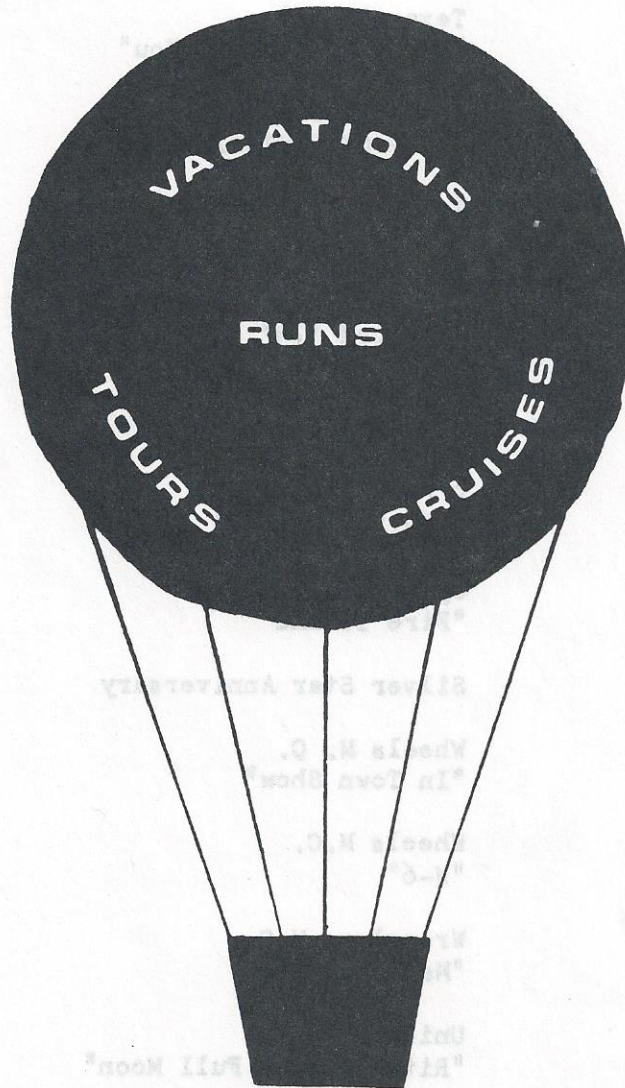
