
The crowd around the paperback book sales somehow never did seem to thin out (left-hand snap shows Al C. and Gerry V. peddling their wares).

JOIN THE BLOODLINE

... by Rod H.

There is a bond that links all men and women in the world so closely and intimately, that every difference of color, religious belief and cultural heritage is insigificant beside it. Never varying in temperature more than five or six degrees, composed of 55 percent water, the life stream of blood runs in the viens of every member of the human race which proves that the family of man is a reality. In time of need where a single human life can be saved by another's blood, it is necessary to know some facts about blood donors and the procedures involved.

WHO CAN GIVE BLOOD? Anyone in good health weighing at least 110 lbs. and age 18 or over. Anyone 66 years or older must present a written consent from their personal physician dated two weeks within donation.

HOW OFTEN MAY I GIVE BLOOD? Every 8 weeks up to 5 times within a 12-month period.

WHAT DOES THE RED CROSS DO BEFORE

I DONATE? Each donor is asked
about his medical history, such as
past illnesses, Blood pressure, temperature, pulse, weight and hemoglobin
determinations are taken by registered nurses.

MAY I EAT BEFORE DONATIONS? Yes, you should eat regular meals, but refrain from fried and fatty foods such as butter, eggs, cream, mayonnaise, etc. during the four hours prior to your donation.

DO I OBTAIN A CARD STATING MY BLOOD TYPE? Yes, after your first donation you will receive a card showing your blood group (A, B, O or AB) and type (Rh negative or positive). This wallet-sized card also records the date and place of donation.

HOW CAN MY BLOOD DONATION SAVE
FOUR LIVES? Your pint of blood is
not always transferred in its "whole"
blood state. Blood is also separated
into several components such as
plasma, used in the treatment of
burns and shock. White cells and
platelets are clotting agents used
in the treatment of leukemia and
other marrow diseases. Red cells are
used for the treatment of anemia.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE BLOOD? The Massachusetts Red Cross Blood Program will provide the total blood needs for every hospitalized patient in the State regardless of race, colo creed or place of residence. There is no compulsory requirement and no eligibility requirement except that of need. When blood is needed, there are no charges for the blood itself. However, most hospitals charge the patient for laboratory and administrative costs in connection with blood transfusions.

HOW CAN A MASS. RESIDENT HELP A CLOSE RELATIVE WHO IS HOSPITALIZED AND USED BLOOD OUTSIDE OF THE STATE?

If a Massachusetts resident has donated to the Mass. Red Cross Blood Program within the past 12 months, al whole blood and blood components used by his immediate family wherever they are hospitalized within the U.S. and Canada, will be replaced through the Mass. Red Cross Blood Program.

WHAT ABOUT A NON-RESIDENT WHO DONATES TO THE MASS. RED CROSS BLOOD PROGRAM?

A non-resident who donates to this program at least once a year is eligible for replacement of all blood and blood components used by him/her members of his/her immediate family when hospitalized outside of Mass.

When you join the Red Cross Bloodline, you join a proud people who share a cause; preserving life. You help to fill a daily patient's need in Mass. for over 1300 pints of blood. One pint of your blood gives life to as many as four people. That' what the Bloodline is all about.

STRAINS OF LEATHER

Editors Note: "Strains of Leather" is an opinion commentary gathered from the thoughts and points of view of club members and individuals in the L/L scene.

This month, we will take a look at the makeup of various clubs, and to try to pinpoint the attraction which is drawing several L/L guys to the membership ranks. I suppose we all should take the moment to figure out what makes us want to join clubs and for what purpose are we individually seeking satisfaction from them, and if the attraction is still there and meaningful.

Some guys have joined the ranks of leather clubs for purely social reasons. The many clubs from East to West coast do provide a neat fabric which, when woven together, makes it possible for us to travel from city to city. It can sometimes become monotonous, week after week, run to run, but overall and with good feeling, it's nice to know that you can land in any strange town and be wel-

comed by a native club, especially when they see the familiar overlay over your leather jacket....or do they? I mean the leather part.

Oddly enough, a greater percentage of "leather club" members are not really into leather. This is not to be confused with the S/M approach (we'll talk about that later). It is strange to see how many men come walking into club meetings or various functions without any stitch of leather on. It is rather appalling at times to see fellow club members without their club overlays on.

But what is most interesting and within a club itself, is to see 90% of so-called "leather" guys decked out in denim in one corner and the remaining dressed in leather sitting in the other corner. The denim faction are sort of nervous in approaching the other dudes, and yet they are all fraternal brothers. Perhaps, it's the leather image coupled with the mystique that anyone completely outfitted in black leather is really "heavy." Two friends I know who decided not to be active in a club, explained that (cont. next page)

they were often shunned and ignored because of their attire. Another club member, a leather craftsman, finds it difficult to believe that most guys will spend dollar after dollar at the bar, yet not invest their bucks into a jacket. He often wonders just what is the attraction that draws guys into clubs, yet they do not wish to conform to the "leather class" of behavior.....and what is the behavior pattern?

Some of the men into the L/L scene joined leather and motorcycle groups for a continuation and an outlet in the S/M scene. Prior experiences and personal practises with rough sex in either the "S" or "M" roles, coupled with all the fantasies and limitless forms of mental and physical expression, served to motivate individuals to becoming part of the leather scene. But not all clubs and bike groups are into that scene. It is a prerequisite within a few clubs that one must own and ride a bike and that one must be, to some degree, into the S/M scene. But these clubs are too few. Some clubs are strictly social and are not into the bike or heavy sex scene at all. It is perhaps alarming to some, that a few clubs refuse to get into it at all and prefer to remain social groups. This is often confusing and restrictive to the individual who wants to join a club for the purpose of experiencing the leather syndrome.

It is rather difficult for a club to set itself up to follow a definite course: objective and purpose. Perhaps, the reason that some clubs find themselves caught up in the mire of politics and personality factions within the ranks is because there really is no single objective. It's a club that simply wants to be all things to all people. And for that reason, membership committees are screening applicants with really no set of guidlines nor set philoso-

phy or policy. So, conflicts remain and members cannot relate with one another because their reasons for joining a club differ a great deal.

Lately, we find several independents finding their way to the doorsteps of many clubs, seeking membership. Their reasons for joining are many. Some want the feeling of fraternal security, while others have experienced the leather trip and want to further cultivate it with others of the same thinking. My advice to the applicant is to seek a club that will provide you some satisfaction whatever state of mind yourself to be into. My advice to club membership committees is to screen applicants accordingly so that they are not confused with the club's objectives, goals, and philosophy on the leather scene. It will provide for a better tightly-woven membership and less dissent where all can enjoy what the club has to offer.

If our club objectives are to constantly seek and make new friends as well as broadening the leather base, then we ought to make sure that what we are seeking in our own minds just what we are all about and how we identify with the leather scene.....or else it's back to fluffsville.

Stay happy! Keep it together!
