#### RUSTY B. QUITS — WILL ORGANIZE TITANS

The many months of diligent planning by the AMCC '76 Bicentennial Run Committee is beginning to bear concrete results. With the selection of the run site (Atlantic City) along with hotel facilities (Sheraton-Deauville) to accommodate the approximately 1000 participants expected to attend this gala affair, the stage is now set to begin planning a detailed agenda.

Many of the AMCC clubs have already started planning individual projects to raise money to subsidize their own members' way to AMCC '76. With over a year's period of time remaining prior to this event the expense to be borne by individual members should be minimal. The cost for this run is expected to be less than \$300. per person, which may seem expensive at a first glance. However, under close scrutiny this is not the case at all. In fact, this is less than the cost of three out of town runs for most members. And if the AMCC clubs make an effort to keep club functions to a minimum during 1976 the cost of AMCC '76 should not


prove to be a financial burden to all.




#### FEEDBACK


Kindly note: Contrary to what has been stated in the AMCC '76 Press Release dated April 4, 1975, and what was stated in the VANGUARDS column of WHEELS MAGAZINE of April, it should be made clear that Entre Nous had no prior knowledge nor any part in any pre-conceived arrange-ment (which there wasn't any) of a site selection for the bicentennial run. The NOUS LETTRE, which was distributed on Sunday, March 23rd after the AMCC '76 meeting, was pre-printed two weeks earlier. was, therefore, impossible to have known the results of the meeting and the site selection. In fact, if one re-reads the March issue, the CLUB NEWS column indicated how Entre Nous went on record at its own club meeting to endorse AMCC nominees and its selection of a bicentennial run site. Atlantic City was not Entre Nous' original choice and our delegate was so instructed how to vote on the first ballot when he arrived at the AMCC meeting.

Distribution of the NOUS LETTRE

was not held up for any reason.

And while on the subject as we are sure there are some doubting Thomases, the "AMCC '76 Atlantic City" motorcycle plates, which were pre-made and issued by SMC-Lost Angels during the meeting of the Bicentennial Committee on March 22rd, were distributed merely as a public relations method of promoting that site ... and it so happened that the majority clubs within AMCC chose that site. We agree with Jack of the VANGUARDS, that someone would have been stuck with a lot of useless license plates had Atlantic City not been chosen.




It seemed no matter where we went after that, we ran into one of our brothers from
