


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AN	OTHER VERY	SPECIAL	THANK Y	YOU

Mr. Perelman has made an apparently irrevocable decision to move to London in October, there to live as a self-exiled American. He will become a "resident alien," with no expectation of returning to the nation in which he has won acclaim as lampoonist laureate.
