



Gentlemen:

I am writing to inform you about a recent decision of mine. As you may know, I have been giving considerable thought to the idea of pledging for membership to one of Boston's three major cycle organizations. This has not been an easy decision on my part.

Each organization has its strengths, weaknesses, advantages, and disadvantages. I have found sincerity and have formed a genuine friendship with a number of members in all three fraternities.

My reasons for not pledging two of these organizations is neither based on any aversion to members already in the fraternity nor their stated organizational goals - rather - it is a personal preference based on the premise that with my interests and life suay, there is nothing substantial that I personally would be able to contribute to those respective fraternities.

This brings me to the question: Why pledge the Vikings?
What mutual benefit can be derrived from association with Vikings
that is elusive in the other fraternities? The answer for me lies
within two realms, the objective and the emotional. Over the past
several months I have observed from a distance Viking members on a
number of occasions; be it formally at a meeting, informally at
social events, socially at one of the local pubs, ad nauseam,
conducting themselves in an open and friendly manner with others
while at all times maintaining a gentle but masculine dignity.

My first impression was one of quiet respect. Having had the opportunity to gradually come into contact with several members over a period of time, this respect has increased rather than decrease. Intellectually, (and by this I mean not only acquired knowledge but also native intellect), the Viking calibre is high - very high, and this also is very gratifying.

But all of this is nothing unless there is a bond - an emotional bond of fellowship among members. I have found this to be true with Vikings. This bond is more important than first perceived. If a stress situation arises, it seems to me that one Viking will have no hesitation in asking another or other Vikings for assistance. And the feedback from the first member reinforces that bond of brotherhood even more than ever. This is good and this is important.

One final point: vis-a-vis one phrase of Mr. Wakefield's written statement of several weeks ago. He successfully pointed out how one does not lose his individuality and identity if he is a member of a particular primary group, if both the individual and the group inter-act within a flexible framework of understanding. This struck me as singularly important. Everyone must maintain a semblance of personal identity throughout their life, and it is heartening to see that this <u>is</u> the case with the Vikings.

I will be proud to pledge myself to this team.
