

Let me make note that the Vikings M.C. is solvent, and I hope it stays that way. After listening to how other clubs function, I would say that the Vikings outshine them all as far as finances and brotherhood are concerned. In the future I shall bring a motion to the club that we make a great effort to accumulate enough money to enable the club to make a one or two-week trip to Europe. I weigh these, and if I find that their faults outweigh their good characteristics, I have nothing more to do with them. If their good qualities outweigh their faults, I must overlook these faults to be honest with myself and create a friendship that will be longlasting. Friendships do not happen; they must be nourished and worked upon. If you cannot do this and if you feel constant hestility toward your brother Viking, then leave the club. You do yourself harm and you do the Vikings immeasurable harm. As a proud Viking my only concern is for the Vikings. I honestly consider all of you my friends and shall remain your friend whether you are a Viking or not. If you really set your mind to it, our differences are not segrest.

As long as I'm shooting my mouth off, let me say that anything carried to an extreme is harmful whether it hostility or democracy. A democracy is only as good as its people, and its people are only as good as their leaders. It is now time to make arrangements for Leif Erikson. Let's start now, and I say this not as your Treasurer but as a member. Within the next two months I would like to see a run site selected. Once this is done, the other committees can be appointed to make Leif Erikson '72 more successful than the last one. It's tough climbing a mountain alone; let's work together to make an outstanding run a perfect run. Can we top the success of Leif Erikson '71? You bet your ass we can!


