


The Vikings M.C. are proud to host the first in a series of AMCC'76 Bicentennial Run Registration Drives. The AMCC'76 Committee has worked hard to bring the run to its present stage of planning. There are many more hours of work facing them in the future. I certainly hope that the club members will support the committee by offering their assistance whenever, and however, they are able. The most important aspect at this point is to make plans to attend AMCC'76, and, to be an active participant in the largest and most ambitious gathering of the clan.

The above is, I am sure, something that would be considered non-controversial in any club magazine. The following paragraphs, however, are an analysis that might cause some controversy. It is, however, an expression of my thoughts, and, I am grateful to my club and our editor for allowing me to present them in our club newsletter.

While the AMCC'76 Bicentennial Celebration is moving along in high gear, the AMCC Council itself is having growing pains. Its inaction on the recent Thunderbolt Anniversary issue has opened a crack in the foundation. Similiar or even more flagrant violations will certainly occur. Each violation spreading the crack until the house collaspes onto itself.

In our nations bicentennial year, it might be apt to consider an analogy between the nation and the council. The independent clubs, like the independent states, recognized a need for a federation, and formed the AMCC. In due process, both formed con—stitutions, and amended them in the course of their history. The AMCC duly ratified its revised constitution on July 4th weekend in 1974. The nation faced a most serious issue in the struggle for states right swith slavery supposedly the major issue. However regional self interests were the basic issues then, as it is now in the council. A refusal to recognize problems and an ineffective governing body led to secession, and, a bloody Civil War. Let us consider that the AMCC is at this point in the microanalogy of our nations history. The question before us is: "Do we continue to follow the parallel that is leading us to secession and civil war, or, do we take off our transparent blindfolds and be honest with one another?"

As its first prority, the council must face up to the problems that threaten its own existence, The council should start now to anticipate the problems that could lie ahead, and start molding the solutions. The club representatives should not groan at the prospect of a long business meeting, but, rather, spend the time now to prevent the confrontations that cause the ever widening carck in the foundation. The council must prepare and offer its members stronger incentives to be a part of the union. The member clubs must in turn be patriotic, and, stand behind the council with faithful compliance to the constitution. Faced with non-compliance by a member club, the council must exercise its powers if it is to justify its existence. Admittedly, the enforcement powers of the council are limited to such items as censure and ostracism. However, it requires total support from the member clubs to be effective. The time has come to stand and be counted for or against the union.

OTHER FUND' INC" a full time fundraising body, is, essentially, a gay united fund. It has come into existence to financially assist projects proposed by groups and individuals which meet defineable needs in the gay community, here in Boston.

In the past, there have been projects that could not be implemented because fundraising was outside the scope of the proposer(s), or, due to seed money not being available. In addition, projects have been delayed due to the necessary, and, often time consuming, task of fund raising. OTHER FUND, INC., is an attempt to help individuals and groups solve problems such as these.

The boundaries of conventional philanthropies, the United Fund, various foundations and corporations, generally exclude gay related projects, in effect, challenging gay people to help themselves and their own community. OTHER FUND is a step toward meeting that challenge.

The VIKINGS M.C., and our brothers of ENTREZ NOUS, along with many outside the L/L scene, have offered to help OTHER FUND meet this challenge. In November, the VIKINGS will hold a benefit to support the OTHER FUND. Date and time of the benefit are as yet to be announced. As soon as both have been set, it will be made public.


I think that it is time that we in the community support a project such as this, and, along with my brothers of the VMC, we hope to see you in November.
